MEETING MINUTES-JANUARY

The January meeting of the Iowa Dressage and Combined Training Association was called to order on January 4, 2015 at 2:28pm.

Board members present were Tammy Lisi, Sharon Malmberg, Danielle Baker, PJ Koehler, Sherie Vermeer, and Nena Denman.

Board members not in attendance were Barb Zukowski, and Chris Gutierrez.

Motion to approve the meeting's agenda was made by PJ and seconded by Danielle.

Motion to approve November's treasurer's report was made by PJ and seconded by Sharon.

Scott Visser thanked the club for the work and the support we have given to him and his family since the death of his wife, Stephanie.

The Iowa Equestrian Center has informed the club that they will not be able to give us the weekend in October for the Championship show. They are holding the dates of November 14 and 15, 2015 as possibilities for us. Other venues are being researched.

Entries will be out around the end of January for the adult day camp featuring Matt McLaughlin and Larry Bradley, along with other fun activities.

Rates are being researched for venues for the Western Dressage clinic and schooling show with Rebecca O'Bea and the Dolly Hannon clinic.

The Iowa Dressage Classics are June 13 and 14, 2015 at MLEC with judges Sue Malone Casey and Bev Rogers. There will be over \$1000 in prize money for the FEI classes as well as combined training and vintage rider opportunities. The club is working to get our shows to count for other association's award programs as well as theirs counting towards ours. This may include Nebraska Dressage Association, Central States Dressage and Eventing Association, Illinois Dressage and Combined Training Association, St. Louis Area Dressage Society, and Kansas City Dressage Society.

Nena spoke briefly about her time at the USDF Annual Convention. Details can be found in the Collection.

PJ gave a brief introduction to her article on Western Dressage. The entire article will be in the Collection.

The calendar for the schooling series will be coming out soon. Dates for the Fantasy Schooling Show series at MLEC will be May 2-3, 2015, July 11-12, 2015, and September 26-27, 2015.

All ads for sponsorships must be complete when submitted. No changes will be made. They will need to be submitted to the club by May 15 to allow time to make the program for the Classics. All profits from the sale of the polo shirts will go to the awards budget.

New changes will take place in 2015 for awards. Riders must earn 3 scores of at least 58% from 2 different judges to earn an award. Changes are still being worked on for combined training. Award standings will be regularly posted through Facebook and the Collection. Western Dressage will also have a year-end award. Rider groups will be separates as: Junior rider under 14, Junior rider under 21, Adult Amateur, Open, and Vintage. There will be more rider recognition awards as well as a 70% club, and Rookie of the Year. Volunteer of the year will be awarded based on highest number of hours volunteered.

Motion to adjourn at 3:01pm was made by Danielle and seconded by PJ.

Next meeting will be February 10, 2015 at 6:30pm at Okoboji Bar and Grill in Newton, IA.


How to Loosen Your Way to A More Effective Riding Seat

I know what you're going to say. You have probably been told to NEVER arch your back while riding.

They say that an arched back creates tension through the body. They implore you to avoid letting the energy "out" through the hind end, and that when your back arches, your pelvis tilts backward, thereby lifting the tail bone off the saddle.

Of course, there is good reason for this. Essentially, when you arch your lower back, you lose your "three point" contact with the saddle (two pelvic bones and the tail bone). The seat bones then end up dropping down and backward in the saddle, which results in a "perched" seat position. Any hope you have for communicating through the seat will be dashed in this



position, as your body will have to work overtime just to keep balanced with the horse, never mind try to be effective in any other way.

But I'm here to say, "Never say never!"

Many of us have less than adequate movement through our hips and lower backs to start with. Whether our joints, ligaments and tendons are shortened (tightened) through age, or through tension, or (over)use – or for whatever other reason – I really think that more of us have tight lower backs than not. Many of us have to work hard to "loosen" through the lower back – which then translates to a more active and released core, hips, legs and even upper body.

There are some people who have wonderfully flowing backs and soft but toned abs, cores, and upper backs. So if you are one of those people who have little to no issues with following the horse's movement, please disregard the rest of this article!

On the other hand, if you bounce in the saddle, fall out of sync with your horse's movement, or otherwise feel less than balanced and effective, maybe some of the following ideas might help.

Bring Attention to the Lower Back

One of the easiest ways to isolate the lower back area is to touch it while you are riding. So, put both reins in one hand and place the back of your other hand in the small of your back. Feel the amount of movement that goes on there. Is it flowing easily with the horse's movement? Is it too tight? Could there be more movement and release?

Try this at the walk, trot and canter as it will be different at each gait. Don't be surprised if you find tension even at the walk. We often carry more tightness than we think we do.

Keep your hand over the lower back area and start playing with movement at each gait. Try some transitions and see how the energy flows (or doesn't) through your lower back in the transitions. When do you brace? Where do you flop?

Once you have a good feeling of what is actually going on, work toward moving that area more with the horse. Look for better flow, better rhythm through your own back and less bounce in the saddle (especially in the canter).

The Secrets to the Looseness

To be perfectly honest, even after you *feel* like you are arching your back, you really won't be arching in the way that causes a negative effect to you and/or your horse. Precisely because of your stiffness or tightness, what feels like an arch is more like a straightening of your lower back. So while you feel like you are in the arch moment, you are in fact only allowing your pelvis to tilt enough to actually keep position while the horse moves.

The other secret is that you must "loosen" in movement. Therefore, you won't be holding the arch for any length of time. Instead, you will be moving into and out of the arch in rhythm with the horse's movement – thereby not really holding an arch at all.

Once you have the feeling with your hand in the arch of your lower back, remove your hand and take up the other rein again. Think/feel to the lower back and keep it moving as if your hand is still there. Any time you feel the stiffness coming on, take your hand back there again and find the looseness.

What Not To Do

Finally, beware the "flop." The opposite extreme of the tight back is the jello back. If you find that you let your lower back go too much, thereby really arching too deeply, you have to hold more tension at the end of each stride so that you don't just flop into the saddle.

There is such thing as too much of a good thing!

There are many more details to developing an effective riding seat, but finding that flowing lower back is the first step.

All you really need to do is become more aware of the movement through your lower back, to know what it feels like to really allow the back to move in tandem with the horse's back, and to release enough to be able to maintain an honest three-point position in the saddle.

2014 Convention

Boston, Massachusetts

Very Condensed Notes and Summary by Nena Denman

I recently had the pleasure of attending the USDF Annual Convention in Cambridge, MA. What follows are the highlights that members of IaDCTA may find informative.

Group Member Organizations Committee

- It is important to reach out to other local organizations and inform them of the activities of IaDCTA. Suggestions include 4H, local riding clubs, Horse Fairs, Pony Club, Breed Associations, and the Iowa Horseman's Association.
- A survey for members could provide information about what members want and expect from the IaDCTA.
- Reach out to members with age appropriate communication. For example, an IPhone video, You Tube, or BLOG software (Word Press)
- Nominations for GMO year-end awards can be sent in at any time starting in January. There will be an online submission form.
- Have social and educational events. USDF has free educational materials available on line that can be used for presentations and discussions.

Fund Raising

- Go overboard on thank you notes. Send notes, list donors in newsletters, have a donors' party.
- Apply for the Dressage Foundation educational grants. Vi Hopkins gives \$2K for camps, symposiums, and seminars. The application forms are on the website.
 Sustaining partnerships or making a donation to the Foundation helps with receiving funds.

Membership Committee

There will be a new GMO guide on the USDF website.

- Dec. 1 is the deadline for the initial GMO roster. IaDCTA can send in just one name to avoid the penalty fee. Voting strength is determined by the September roster.
- · Be sure to update officials located in each GMO and/or region.
- Be sure the correct member chair is on file.
- Consider changing GMO membership year to help with USDF submission, etc.

Education

- Many free program options for GMOs and members including ETRAK.
- Members can sign into earn free "University" credits.
- Dressage on the Go- audio tracks, save to device or laptop, pull into Itunes music.
- A Ride-a Test format can give credit if GMO applies and pays a \$30 fee.
- Could give an annual GMO diploma for credits earned.
- HART- On the USDF website, riders can track hours of training. Great for youth members. Awards/certificates are given.

Adult Programs.

- Clinics are really symposiums open to auditors. They focus on the training of the horse. Auditors do not have to belong to USDF and riders do not have to be USEF members.
- No competition scores are required for application. A video showing the horse's training is needed. Riders are chosen based on the topic of the symposium. It is a good idea to reapply. Regional Directors have the criteria for their region. Horses with common problems are selected.
- Good opportunity to include breed associations.
- There are 9 clinics, one in each region, over a 2 year cycle. Hilda Gurney sessions are available on Pod Cast.
- Region 4 will be held on May 16-17 at Providence Farm, in Palmyra Nebraska.
 Betsy Steiner and Kathy Connelly will work together to teach riders and auditors.
 There might be a group discount so a GMO could organize a tour.

Competition Management

- Show Biz- new edition. Nena bought a copy.
- USDF considering having a Level 1 and 2 show manager mentor program.
- Judges may start with a provisional license for the first two years. This will help with problems concerning professional behavior.
- Saddle pad logos must be under 200 square cm and cannot list awards won in the past. Breed logos can only be worn by that breed.
- Prize Lists-To avoid penalty or incorrect prize list, let USEF and USDF know of any changes.
- Qualifying rides- List every highest test at a level as qualifying in the program to avoid problems. Riders do have to declare to qualify or not. As of 2016, riders will be able to ride more than one qualifying ride a day and a test of choice may be included.
- Qualifying fees are supposed to be sent to USEF even if the entry scratches.
- New rule change will allow Introductory to be listed as an Opportunity class so horse fees do not need to be paid. Level 3 shows can have 2 Intro, 2 Training, and 2 First level classes. We will have to change the prizelist.
- · Equine vaccination requirements are being considered.
- National Show expenses are paid by related fees.

Freestyle

- New tests clearly state that only movements and transitions shown at a level can be used in a freestyle at that level.
- Competitions must provide the sound system. Elimination for failure to enter the arena is at the judge's discretion.
- Leg-yield must be a minimum of 12 meters.
- All trot must be sitting at Second and above.

Instructor Trainer

- 103 current certified instructors
- New FEI certificate added.
- On-line courses mandatory before attending workshops.
- 2015 programs in Wisconsin, Ohio, and California
- Trainer clinic, January 19, Loxahachee Florida with Stephen Clark

Judges

- New tests with changes in order of difficulty and better viewing for judging
- Halt must be minimum of 3 seconds, but not before a reinback
- · Submission has added definition willing cooperation, straightness
- Rider's scores reduced from 3 to 2 (position and seat, correct and effective use of the aids)
- More room for comments at lower levels

L program

- Hard to fund because first sessions must earn enough money to finance the last sessions.
- Auditors can attend Sessions A, B, and C. These are updated and educational.

Awards

- Equitation- developing new awards
- Vintage Cup Open and Adult Amateur 50 years and over

Sport Horse

- Breeding numbers seem to be down at present.
- Different series in one region causes limited entries.
- Schedule at the end of the day.
- New score sheets have more divisions to further explanations.

International Competitions

- Fund Raising USET needs volunteers at Wellington, Florida, and San Diego,

IaDCTA Awards

The IaDCTA Awards program is designed to recognize achievement of those riders who consistently earn good scores and advances their riding level, and encourages a high standard of horsemanship in Dressage, Combined Training, and Western Dressage at IaDCTA-approved shows.

Guidelines for All Awards

- Only scores from IaDCTA Recognized Dressage, Combined Training, and Western Dressage show will be counted towards IaDCTA Awards.
- Rider of the horse must be an IaDCTA member at the time qualifying scores are earned.
- Each Horse must be registered at the time qualifying scores are earned.
- A Rider may only qualify to win at two consecutive levels on the same horse, but Riders may qualify as many Horses as they wish.
- If Riders share a Horse, the Horse will be limited to four riders per day at two consecutive levels, and only one Horse and Rider combination per level or class.
- A protective ASTM approved hard hat with chin harness must be worn when mounted regardless of rider's age or level of competency.
- 7. A Rider is not allowed to enter more than 1 division. (i.e., cannot enter Open and AA.)
 - a. Definitions of Rider Divisions:
 - Adult Amateur (AA): for Dressage, competitors shall compete as Adults from the beginning of the calendar year in which they reach age 22 (USEF rules GR101).
 - Open division is for professionals as described by USEF rules GR1306.
 - iii. Young Riders (JR/YR) are 21 and under.
 - iv. Junior 14 (JR14) are 14 years and under.
- Dressage and Western Dressage Scores must be equal to or greater than 58.000% to count towards IaDCTA Awards. Combined Training Results will be submitted as a placing for the class and awarded points towards a minimum point total to qualify for IaDCTA Awards
- Complete one type of service per Rider. Volunteer hours can only be earned by la DCTA members, and gifted to other laDCTA members.
 - a. Complete 7 hours of volunteer time at laDCTA Recognized events.
 - Recruit 4 new members to laDCTA.
 - Donate \$200.00 cash to IaDCTA.
- The IaDCTA Show Series Year runs from January 1st to October 31st. (2014 Championship Schooling Show results counts towards 2015 awards.)
- Championship rides (IaDCTA, Regional, or other Championships) do not count towards IaDCTA Awards.

Qualifying Scores for Awards

The following tables list the requirements to Qualify for an award for each level.

For example, to Qualify for Training Level Dressage: 5 tests scoring 58.000% or higher must be earned from at least three different judges and one of those scores must be from the highest test of the level.
