Results from 2 or 3 phase tests will be recorded together, only counting penalty points from dressage and stadium from a 3 phase event.

We are also looking for someone to act as youth liaison

There are still openings to ride in the Dolly Hannon clinic in April.

The education committee is looking for ideas for locations and topics to further the education of the members.

- NO Children are allowed in the warm-up area that are not entered in the show.
 Competing children in the warm-up area must be accompanied by their parent (or designated responsible adult).
- ♦ NO Jumping of horses in the warm-up (or on a show course) except during designated posted times and anyone in violation of this rule will be eliminated from the completion with no refund of any fees. Horse not entered in jumping or Prix Caprilli classes may not utilize jumps at any time.
- Show is open to any interested individual.
- Volunteer hours will be available.
- For safety reasons, all riders are required to wear an ASTM approved safety helmet with fastened harness when mounted.
- Ribbons are awarded to 6 places. See above for classes that will be placed as one division.

The Importance of Joining Now Versus at the Last Minute

I am writing this to encourage our current members to inspire any potential new or renewing members to act now and submit their membership forms as soon as possible. There are several reasons for this. The main one is that there is a time lapse between when a membership form is submitted and when it is active.

When you join the IaDCTA, your GMO individual membership is sent to the USDF. This is done at the end of each month, because the roster has to be updated and a check to the USDF needs to be issued. The USDF then may take some time to record your membership. This is important to keep in mind if you intend to attend either educational opportunities or USDF recognized shows. Both may require a fee if not a member. Be sure to have interested parties join the IaDCTA at least 6 weeks before the event to allow for the recording process.

Each membership year begins with December 1 and ends with November 31. The cost is the same whether the membership is for twelve months or twelve days. To take full advantage of being a member, it is recommended that the membership begins early in the annual cycle. The best time to join is in early November so that the USDF can be informed of your membership for the next year.

Have you wondered which membership category is best for you? Hopefully, this explanation will help you make the right decision.

The Iowa Dressage and Combined Training Association is a GMO of the United States Dressage Federation. The IaDCTA offers the following membership types.

- 1) ADULT MEMBERSHIP Adult membership automatically includes an Individual Membership in the USDF. Each adult member will receive the *USDF Connection* magazine, and the IaDCTA's newsletter, *The Collection*. Adult members will receive 1 vote in any IaDCTA elections or voting decision, and will be eligible for Year-End Awards. The Adult Membership costs \$45.
- 2) FAMILY MEMBERSHIP Each family membership includes a primary member and up to 5 secondary members. The family membership must designate the primary member who will also receive the Individual Membership in the USDF. The family membership includes the USDF Connection magazine and the IaDCTA's newsletter, *The Collection*. The family membership receives 2 votes in any IaDCTA elections or voting decisions, and will be eligible for Year-End Awards. The Family Membership costs \$50, with an additional fee of \$10 for each additional family member.
- 3) JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP A junior membership is available to anyone aged 18 years & under. Junior membership automatically includes an Individual Membership in the USDF, the *USDF Connection* magazine, and the IaDCTA's newsletter, *The Collection*. Junior members will receive no votes in any IaDCTA elections or voting decision, but <u>will</u> be eligible for Year-End Awards. The Junior Membership costs \$35.
- **4) NEWSLETTER-ONLY MEMBERSHIP-** A Newsletter-Only Membership includes only a subscription to the IaDCTA Collection newsletter. This type of member does not have any votes and cannot receive Year-End Awards. The Newsletter-Only Membership costs \$25.

All IaDCTA members will receive the IaDCTA Collection electronically, be eligible for IaDCTA Year-End Awards, and may have a reduced rate for club sponsored events. It is important to note that in a Family membership, the person most likely to enroll in USDF sponsored events be designated as the Primary (Individual) member.

When you become an Individual member of the USDF through a GMO, you receive certain benefits. These include, among others:

Member discounts for the USDF store, events, and perks partners.

Full access to e-TRAK on-line learning center.

Printed USDF Connections magazine.

USDF Members Guide.

Full access to USDF scores.

Clinic participation opportunities.

Competition privileges at USEF/USDF competitions.

Qualification for the Breeders Championships.

USDF Rider Awards.

Participation opportunities in qualifying classes for a USDF Dressage Seat Medal.

It is important to understand that in order to compete in USEF Regional Qualifying classes or Championships, the US Dressage Finals, or Dressage Seat Medal Semi-Finals, you must be a USDF Participating member. This membership is obtained through the USDF and currently costs \$60-75. Horses competing at USDF/USEF recognized shows need either a USDF Lifetime Horse Registration number or a USDF Horse Identification number. Again, these are obtained through the USDF.

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Leg Yields – The How, When, and Why Dressage Fundamentals by Christy Rettger

I love leg yields. They are the most basic lateral movement, and for that reason, an incredible tool for green horses and riders new to dressage. To do a leg yield is not real hard, but does require an understanding of a few somewhat complicated concepts. Most people can relatively easily understand the concepts and how to do a leg yield, but then find carrying it out to be slightly counter-intuitive, which is what makes leg yielding such a great exercise. Once it "clicks" for a horse or rider, it's like a big light bulb turns on, and from there the rest of dressage starts to fall into place.

The concepts that a leg yield requires a horse or rider to gain an understanding of mostly hinge around the use of the outside rein. When asking for a leg yield, the horse should be gently flexed away from the direction the horse will be moving in. Alone, flexing the horse gently in either direction is not hard, but when adding the leg yield, the idea of bending the horse into the *outside rein* becomes critical. As the rider asks for the first steps of leg yield, just closing the inside leg is again usually not difficult for the rider, but riding from the inside leg to the *outside rein* is usually a light bulb moment. Then, after the leg yield is finished, straightening the horse not just by ceasing to ask with the inside leg, but also straightening with the *outside rein* is the final ah-ha!

What a Leg Yield Should Look Like:

When the horse does a leg yield, his body will move both forward and sideways, so if he is parallel to the long side of the arena, he travels a line diagonal across the arena. Let's say, for example, we are riding a leg yield from the quarter line (half way between the center line and rail) to the rail, tracking right. The horse starts on the quarter line, traveling straight forward, body parallel to the rail. The horse flexes gently to the right, filling the outside rein. The rider can best influence the inside hind leg to move sideways as it is in the air stepping forward (vs when it is planted on the ground and the outside hind is stepping), so if the horse is walking, as the front left leg steps forward the next step will be the right hind, and if the horse is trotting the front left and right hind step at the same time, and this would be when to ask the right hind to step under the horses body to cross in front of the left hind. As the horse moves sideways, his body stays parallel to the wall, he maintains the right flexion and contact in the left rein. When the leg yield is finished, the rider straightens the horse with the outside rein and may close both legs to send the horse forwards.

Common Errors and "Ah-ha!" Moments:

Most riders are taught to ride with their inside rein by pulling it to turn the horse. And in the first leg yield attempt, most riders will pull the inside rein for the inside flexion and then apply the inside leg to move the horse sideways. And, obediently, most horses will

swing their nose to the inside (following the inside rein) and go sideways through their outside shoulder (since they are not bent into the outside rein), haunches trailing to the inside instead of inside hind stepping under the horse's body and crossing in front of the outside hind.

Usually if the rider notices this happening, they are aware the front end of the horse is moving away from the inside leg faster than the back end of the horse, so they pull the inside rein in an effort to stop the horse from running through the outside shoulder. This is the counter-intuitive part. Only when the rider takes ahold of the outside rein can they catch the outside shoulder and keep it under the horse, straightening the horse so the inside hind will step under the horse correctly. The first time the rider pulls the outside rein and feels the inside hind leg step way under the horse's body they usually go "Ah-ha!" and they understand what is meant by "inside leg to outside rein". The same thing will happen trying to end a leg yield. A novice rider will try to stop the sideways motion of the horse by pulling the inside rein (sending the horse through his outside shoulder) instead of straightening him with the outside rein, and again, this will be an "Ah-ha!" moment when the rider gets it right.

Once the rider understands this idea, the more difficult lateral work will fall into place, as well as more basic work like bending and making circles and good transitions.

Other Uses and Variations for Leg Yields:

Leg yields teach a green horse about moving away from the inside leg, stepping into the outside rein, lifting the back and stretching into the contact, and allowing the

rider to influence the hind end instead of the horse just throwing the shoulders around, as many horses try to do both through ignorance and as an evasion. Leg yield can be used to teach a rider all the same things. During the leg yield, the rider often learns the feeling of the horse lifting its back under the rider, and the rider learns to feel where the shoulders and haunches of the horse are (moving sideways, moving forward in a straight line, haunches falling to the inside, etc). The rider learns how to put the horse on the bit by riding the back end of the horse and bringing the horse's back up, which creates a round horse reaching into the bit. The rider understands the use of diagonal aids, which can then be used for a half-halt and all future lateral work.

Leg yields can also be used on a circle, where the help a horse learn to bend correctly (into the outside rein) vs either following the inside rein in to make the circle smaller, or folding in half at the withers instead of bending correctly, which is usually followed by drifting through the outside shoulder to make the circle bigger. Leg yields into corners can help horses that want to fall onto their inside shoulder and "motorcycle" around corners, or dive in to cut off a corner completely.

Ending leg yields is also a useful exercise for both horse and rider, and again reinforces the importance of outside rein contact vs just drifting away (endlessly) from the inside leg. This can be done on a circle, say by beginning with a 10 m circle, leg yielding out to a 15 m circle and remaining there for twice around, then leg yielding out to a 20 m circle, and so on. This can also be done by leg yielding from the center line to the quarter line, or quarter line to *just inside* the rail (horses/riders that don't understand the outside

rein seem magnetically sucked to the wall, which acts in place of the rider's outside aids).

An even more difficult leg yield is to go from the rail to the quarter line, straighten for a few steps, then continue to leg yield to the center line, straighten again, then continue to the next quarter line, straighten again, then finish the leg yield on the rail across the diagonal from where you started. By straightening the horse for a few steps as you do this exercise, you may not make it across the full diagonal (unless your arena is very long or narrow), but more important training is accomplished than just allowing your horse drift all the way across the diagonal even once the quality of the connection (from the inside leg over the back to the outside rein) has been lost.

An easier variation of the leg yield is to ride it along the wall, with the horse's body positioned at an angle to the wall, haunches stepping on the track to the inside of the rail. This is easier because the wall blocks the horse from going forward instead of forwards/sideways, making it easier for the rider to figure out how to coordinate all the aids.

I also love leg yields for a horse that is spooking at something that isn't scary, as a way of evading work or making the rider nervous. By bending the horse away from the scary object (sometimes a shadow in a corner, a mounting block, a chair, etc.) and leg yielding towards it, the rider remembers to RIDE past the object, and by taking control usually gains confidence. The horse's mind is also occupied by the rider's aids, so the horse has less mental energy left to think about things to spook at. And, if the horse tries to spook anyways, while he's in the position bending to the inside of the arena and around the rider's inside leg, the horse is unable to run through his inside shoulder when

he spooks, usually making a far less dramatic spook attempt.

One further benefit I recently, unfortunately, came to fully understand... if you think your horse is resistant, say when bending or in transitions, or one canter lead is sticky... try riding a leg yield. If the horse knows how to do a leg yield and refuses to do it, or if the rider knows how to ride one and is unable to get even a step from the horse, it's time to call the vet. My leg yields on Liam completely fell apart, and were soon followed by a lack of ability bending left and a seriously lacking left lead canter. I tried taking a lesson in desperation to fix it, and was only more frustrated. Had the vet out, and turns out Liam needs his hocks and stifles injected. He could trot ok enough, but when asked to really carry his weight behind, he was just too sore in those joints. It's regular old arthritis that comes from years of hard work, and some cortisone injections will fix him right up, but my first sign he was over due was when my very willing horse said "No can do, mom".



New USEF Ruling on Equine Influenza & EHV-1

Horses entering the grounds for Federation-licensed competitions must be accompanied by documentation of Equine Influenza Virus (EIV) and Equine Herpesvirus (EHV) (Rhinopneumonitis) vaccinations within 6 months prior to entering the stables.



NO DOCUMENT?

Horses without appropriate documentation may be required to leave the competition grounds upon request by Competition Management.

WHAT TO PROVIDE:



DOCUMENTATION OF THE VACCINATION

You must provide a record of vaccination with specific information about the vaccines administrated in the past 6 months, including:

✓ Vaccine Name

✓ Vaccine Route Mode

☑ Vaccine Batch

✓ Veterinarian

You can also use the USEF Vaccination Record which is available for download on the USEF website.

VACCINES ADMINISTERED BY A NON-VETERINARIAN

If you or someone other than a veterinarian administers the vaccine, you must provide a receipt of vaccine purchase that is signed by the owner or agent in care, custody and control of the horse. Information required includes vaccine name, serial number, expiration date and date of administration.*

The information required for the Vaccination Record is easily available on the package stickers which accompany FLUVAC INNOVATOR $^{\$}$.

Simply ask your veterinarian to place the sticker on your USEF Vaccination Record and sign.

Competition Management may not amend or enhance USEF vaccination requirements without prior approval of the USEF Veterinary Committee.

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2015 IaDCTA Awards

The laDCTA Awards program is designed to recognize achievement of those riders who consistently earn good scores and advance their riding level, and encourages a high standard of horsemanship in Dressage, Combined Training, and Western Dressage at laDCTA-approved shows.

Guidelines for All Awards

- Only Scores from IaDCTA Recognized Dressage, Combined Training, and Western Dressage Shows will be counted towards IaDCTA Awards.
- 2. Rider of the horse must be an IaDCTA member at the time qualifying scores are earned.
- 3. Each Horse must be registered at the time qualifying scores are earned.
- A Rider may only qualify to win at two consecutive levels on the same horse, but Riders may qualify as many Horses as they wish.
- If Riders share a Horse, the Horse will be limited to four rides per day at two consecutive levels, and only one Horse and Rider combination per level or class.
- A protective ASTM approved hard hat with chin harness must be worn when mounted regardless of rider's age or level of competency.
- 7. A Rider is not allowed to enter more than 1 division. (i.e., cannot enter Open and AA.)
 Definitions of Rider Divisions:
 - A. Adult Amateur (AA): for Dressage, competitors shall compete as Adults from the beginning of the calendar year in which they reach age 22 (USEF rules GR101).
 - B. Open division is for professionals as described by USEF rules GR1306.
 - C. Young Riders (JR/YR) are 21 and under.
 - D. Junior 14 (JR14) are 14 years and under.
 - E. Vintage (VIN) are 50 years and over.
- 8. Dressage and Western Dressage Competitors must obtain at three scores of 58.000% or greater from at least two different Judges to count towards IaDCTA Awards. Combined Training Results will be submitted as a placing for the class and awarded points towards a minimum point total to qualify for IaDCTA Awards.
- Complete one type of service per Rider. Volunteer hours can only be earned by laDCTA members, and gifted to other laDCTA members.
 - A. Complete 7 hours of volunteer time at laDCTA Recognized events.
 - Recruit 4 new members to IaDCTA.
 - C. Donate \$200.00 cash to laDCTA.
- The IaDCTA Show Series Year runs from January 1st to October 31st. (2014 Championship Schooling Show results counts towards 2015 awards.)
- Championship rides (IaDCTA, Regional, or other Championships) do not count towards.

IaDCTA Awards

- IaDCTA Championship Show: The final show of the IaDCTA Show Series year. All Rider/Horse teams with Qualifying scores have an opportunity to ride for a Series Championship Award at their Level within their Division at this show.
 - A. Dressage
 - B. Combined Training
 - C. Western Dressage
- Year End Awards: Awards are given out at the Annual Banquet to recognize the year of achievements. Awards are given out for Rider/Horse teams for each Level and Division.
 - A. Dressage
 - B. Combined Training
 - C. Western Dressage
- Horse of the Year: Awards given out at the Annual Banquet for the horse with the highest average of three tests from two different judges (Scores from AA Handler, Rider Tests, and Freestyles with multiple riders are excluded).
- Breed High Point Awards: High Point Awards are awards given out at the Annual Banquet as provided by Breed Clubs, Associations, or sponsored by individuals.
 - A. Breed Awards (Highest average % of qualifying scores)
- Rider Recognition Awards: Are Awards given out at the Annual Banquet recognizing Rider achievement in their Division.
 - A. Open Rider (Highest average % of qualifying scores)
 - B. AA Rider (Highest average % of qualifying scores)
 - C. Jr/YR rider (Highest average % of qualifying scores)
 - D. JR14 (Highest average % of qualifying scores)
 - E. Vintage (Highest average % of qualifying scores)
- 70% Club: An Award given out at the Annual Banquet recognizing exceptional performance. This Award requires one score at 70.000% or higher from the highest test of the level.
- Rookie of the Year: An Award given out at the Annual Banquet recognizing exceptional performance of a first year IaDCTA member. Must be a first year member with IaDCTA, and have the highest average % of qualifying scores for a given Rider/Horse Team.
- Volunteer Award: An Award given out at the Annual Banquet recognizing the IaDCTA member with the highest hours logged by a single member (gifted hours subtract from individual total).

- Qualified Rider Award Medals: An Award given out at the Annual Banquet to recognize Rider Achievement at their level.
 - A. May be earned over one or more years of competition.
 - B. Scores may be earned on one or more horses.
 - C. After receiving the Gold at a given level, the rider cannot earn another medal at that level
 - D. The Rider Awards program is effective January 1, 1998 and is not retroactive.

Combined Training

Combined Training Horse of the Year Award:

- Scores must be from USEA or USDF dressage score sheets which are current at the time of the competition.
- Placings will be determined by the horse/rider combination with the lowest combined scores using penalty points from dressage and stadium.
- Rider is responsible to keep track and provide proof of their scores and penalty points for each competition (only penalty points from Dressage and Stadium are required). If it is a USEA event, a picture or print out of scores from individual phases will be needed from the event.
- Rider is responsible for completing the High Point Award Form and submitting it to the awards committee before the 6th of October of the current show year. A copy of the score sheets with dressage and stadium penalty points will be required.
- To qualify for Combined Training Horse of the Year you will need three scores. Two scores must be from an IaDCTA recognized show. The third can be from either a USEA recognized event or IaDCTA recognized show.
- Scores earned in Championship classes are not eligible for year-end awards. However, scores from Opportunity/schooling show classes at the Championship show are eligible.

Combined Training Championships

To qualify for the Combined Test Championships:

- Each horse/rider MUST have 3 scores from the given level under two different judges and from three different competitions (2 from an IaDCTA competition and 1 from either an IaDCTA or an USEA recognized competition.
- Results from 2 or 3 phase test will be recorded together, only counting penalty points from dressage and stadium in a 3 phase event.

Combined test championships will be offered at the following levels:

Starter (Pre-beginner novice), Beginner Novice, Novice, Training, and Preliminary

Levels will be divided into:

- Open
- Adult Amateur
- Junior/Young Rider
