### Calling All IaDCTA Members – Get Your \$\$\$ Back from the Club

One of the benefits of your GMO membership with the IaDCTA is the availability of funds for members to use to help further their dressage education for clinics, workshops, symposiums or other educational opportunities. All IaDCTA members not serving on the board of directors are eligible to apply for up to \$100 as often as every other year they are a member. The available funds have been untouched for several years so this article's intent is to ensure the members are all aware of this benefit of their membership with the IaDCTA – the Betsy Coester Fund Grant. The following information is directly from the member handbook.

The Betsy Coester Fund Grant program was established in memory of Betsy Coester - one of lowa's most prominent and well-respected equestrians. Betsy was dedicated to helping people learn more about dressage and eventing. The grant is funded by donations from members and sponsors. The Betsy Coester Fund provides financial support to members to help further their dressage education. The grant has typically been given to cover tuition costs for clinics, workshops or other educational opportunities.

### Grant guidelines:

- 1) To apply for a Betsy Coester Fund grant, a member must complete the grant application form in its entirety, including the accompanying essay.
- 2) The application must be received prior to the Board meeting preceding the event for which the grant is being requested. Awards will not be given retroactively for past events.
- 3) The number of Awards given in a particular year will depend on the level of funds available in the Betsy Coester Fund.
- 4) No single award will exceed \$100.
- 5) All IaDCTA members are eligible to receive an award, except for those members serving on the current IaDCTA Board of Directors.
- 6) No member shall receive an award in consecutive years.
- 7) Grant recipients are REQUIRED to submit an article for the Collection newsletter about the event for which the grant was given. The grant money will not be given until this requirement has been fulfilled.

After reviewing each grant application, the IaDCTA Board of Directors decides if and for what amount a particular grant will be given, and will notify the applicant following its decision.

So waste no time! Apply now for funds to help pay for your dressage education. There are clinics in July and August around the state...your application for funds for July will need to be submitted prior to the June 20 board meeting. Please see grant application form located in this edition of the Collection. Best wishes on your quest for furthering your Dressage education!

# Daniel Stewart's Tip of the Month: Fit in to Stand Out!

When we talk about connection we're usually referring to the bond between horse and rider, and the relationship that's created by working together and learning from each other as a team of two equal partners. While this kind of connection is invaluable to achieving success in any riding discipline, there's another form of connection that's just as important.

The second form of connection proven to contribute to sport success is something called **social connection** - the feeling that you fit-in and are emotionally connected to those around you (your trainers and ride mates for example). **Enjoying every moment** at the barn (including the relationships you develop there) actually improves your chance of riding well and helps you

develop a sense of belonging and the feeling of mattering that combine to create something called *sport longevity* - the desire to always stay involved in riding - regardless of any challenges that might pop up along the way.

Sadly, without social connection, the tears, fears and rears that are common to riding might cause you to question your desire to stay involved in riding forever (your brain is actually wired to avoid these situation). Since riding means so much to you, you need to do all you can to avoid letting this happen.

The good news is that **social connection is easy to create**. Organizing special barn-events like a year-end award banquet, trainer's birthday party, or group fitness class will do the trick. Preshow dinners, horse-show car-pools, evening seminar series, and weekend movie nights at the barn are some ideas other groups have used to create group bonding. Any social event that brings your barn together will get the job done. In between events you can keep the social connection going by doing quick random acts of kindness (called five-minute favors) to those around you. Cleaning your trainers bridle while she works a horse or tidying up the wash-rack for a friend while she turns-out her horse are a few easy ways to keep the social connection alive.

Why not think a special barn event and begin planning it? Remember... it takes teamwork to make a dream work!

### The Mews at Rolex

By now, most interested fans have heard the news about who won Rolex 2016. Hats off the Michael Jung and his great mare. The abilities of both athletes account for their fabulous finishes in both 2015 and 2016. This article in not going to be more news of what happened on course or in the arenas at Rolex, but instead will attempt to explain what happens behind the scenes, in the mews. I have been able to serve as a Level 1 FEI Eventing Steward at Rolex for the past 2 years and learned a great deal. Specifically, I will share some of the ways the stables and horses at Rolex are managed.

It is important to understand the Rolex is the only Four Star event in the United States of America. It is governed by the Federation Equestrian Internacionale (FEI) and the event follows the FEI rules. The stable management and stewarding guidelines for Four Star events are at a more stringent level than other venues, where there may be a limited number of FEI competitors. As a result, many riders who participate in Rolex may not be familiar with the FEI guidelines. They may have participated at events that allow a more flexible adherence to the rules and so, go through a learning process while at Rolex that prepares them for other international Four Star and Five Star competitions.

### Monitoring the Mounts

At Rolex, for the welfare of all competitors, the horses are carefully monitored.

While on the grounds, their temperatures are taken twice daily and recorded on a chart posted outside their stalls. Horses are officially examined at least 4 other times throughout the event. The first inspection occurs when the horses arrive,

no matter what time of day or night, and before they enter the stabling area. Horses are unloaded from their trailers or vans and proceed to the veterinary examination stalls. These are in an area separate from the competitors' stalls and where all medications or procedures are conducted. In the vet area, pulse, respiration, and temperatures are taken and a base-line is noted. All travel documents, passports, and medical forms are examined, and any difficulties resulting from travel receive attention. If horses pass this initial inspection, they are allowed in the stabling area. All medications and treatments throughout the event are carried out in the vet area and must be accompanied by appropriate paperwork (Medication form) signed by the FEI veterinarian.

The second inspection occurs when the horses are jogged, or trot-up, prior to dressage. This is an exciting time as fans and supporters eagerly await to see if their favorites pass the soundness check. The alley up which the horses walk and trot is decorated with flowers, and the riders compete for a Best-Dressed award. Horses that do not pass the initial jog are escorted by an FEI steward and removed to a holding pen. The steward remains with the horse from that moment until it is released. Only the rider, coach, and team veterinarian are allowed in the area. Here the horse may be walked and a veterinarian from the official Rolex team will further examine the horse. His/her opinion about the ability of the horse to continue is shared with the judging team. The held horse is returned for a second jog, where they may be passed or eliminated.

The third examination is held after the cross country course. In the Vet box, horses are stripped of their tack and cooled down. Troughs of cold water and ice are provided, but horses have their own buckets. Veterinarians examine each

horse checking respiration and temperature several times before the horse is released to return to the barn.

The fourth inspection is held the morning of stadium jumping. Horses are checked to see if there are any repercussions from cross country before they are allowed to continue to the final phase.

### Limited Access

Throughout the event, interaction between horses is very limited. Grooms and riders are reminded to not allow their horses to "visit" with other mounts. Horses from different barns or trainers are separated by empty stalls. A limited number of staff is allowed with each horse. This usually consists of the rider and groom, chef d'equipe, team veterinarian, team coach, and one or two horse owners. Persons not directly connected with a horse, including FEI stewards, are not to touch any horses. Each person admitted to the stabling area must be on a prior list and have an event issued photo badge.

Dogs associated with the competitors are allowed in the stabling area. However, the canines must either be in a pen or on a leash shorter than 6 feet and attached to a human.

### Supervision

Adherence to the FEI rules is observed throughout the week. Schooling times are scheduled and a limited number of horses are allowed in the warm up areas at any one time. Riding times outside of those scheduled may be requested.

However, an FEI steward is present at any schooling, warm up, or galloping session. Horses may be walked and grazed, but are limited to identified areas and

must be wearing their competition numbers. All movement of horses between stables, grazing, practice, cantering, warm up, and competition area must be randomly controlled by Stewards.

The barns are constantly supervised and stable security is mandatory at the CCI4\* level. All stalls are cleaned and disinfected prior to the event. All the horses are stabled inside of a fenced-in area, and the gates are guarded around the clock. FEI stewards are present from 6:00 AM until 11:00 PM and check that the horses are cared for. They will contact grooms if attention is needed. When the gates are locked, a night guard starts to patrol the stabling area. All treatments, such as those involving vibrators or electricity are limited and must have an accompanying steward. Admittance between the hours of 11 PM and 6 AM is limited to those grooms who have obtained prior permission from the chief FEI steward. They are accompanied by an FEI steward. No one is allowed to stay in the stabling area overnight and horses are not permitted to leave the grounds.


### International Horses

At Rolex 2016, horses from Germany, England, New Zealand, and Canada were among those in the international area. Horses that have traveled from another country are stabled in an area separate from the national horse stalls and with its own veterinary stalls. This isolation from the domestic horses is in part due to very strict USDA and Kentucky Department of Agriculture laws regarding importation of breeding stock horses and minimizing the spread of CEM (Contagious Equine Metritis) which causes abortion. Also, by stabling them in their own compound, horses can then return to their home country without having to go through quarantine on their return. Separate warm up times may be

allocated to international horses. Individual horses may be escorted by a steward whenever they leave the stabling area.

### What is important?

At Rolex, although some of this sounds overly restrictive, the highest priority is the welfare of the animals in the competition and insurance of their safety. Every attempt is made to prevent diseases from being transmitted, and that horse management is at its highest level. What happens in front of the spectators is the exciting portion of the competition, but what happens behind the scenes, in the mews, is crucial to competitors, horses, and the equine industry.

Horses entering the grounds for Federation-licensed competitions must be accompanied by documentation of Equine Influenza Virus (EIV) and Equine Herpesvirus (EHV) (Rhinopneumonitis) vaccinations within 6 months prior to entering the stables.



### **NO DOCUMENT?**

Horses without appropriate documentation may be required to leave the competition grounds upon request by Competition Management.

You must provide a record of vaccination with specific information about the vaccines administrated in the past 6 months, including:

✓ Vaccine Route Mode

You can also use the USEF Vaccination Record which is available for download on the USEF website.

### **VACCINES ADMINISTERED BY A NON-VETERINARIAN**

If you or someone other than a veterinarian administers the vaccine, you must provide a receipt of vaccine purchase that is signed by the owner or agent in care, custody and control of the horse. Information required includes vaccine name, serial number, expiration date and date of administration.\*





### **EASE-OF-USE STICKER**

The information required for the Vaccination Record is easily available on the package stickers which accompany FLUVAC INNOVATOR $^{\$}$ .

Simply ask your veterinarian to place the sticker on your USEF Vaccination Record and sign.

Competition Management may not amend or enhance USEF vaccination requirements without prior approval of the USEF Veterinary Committee.

### IaDCTA Awards

The IaDCTA Awards program is designed to recognize achievement of those riders who consistently earn good scores and advance their riding level, and encourages a high standard of horsemanship in Dressage, Combined Training, and Western Dressage at IaDCTA-approved shows.

### Guidelines for All Awards

- Only Scores from IaDCTA Recognized Dressage, Combined Training, and Western Dressage Shows will be counted towards IaDCTA Awards.
- 2. Rider of the horse must be an IaDCTA member at the time qualifying scores are earned.
- 3. Each Horse must be registered at the time qualifying scores are earned.
- A Rider may only qualify to win at two consecutive levels on the same horse, but Riders may qualify as many Horses as they wish.
- If Riders share a Horse, the Horse will be limited to four rides per day at two consecutive levels, and only one Horse and Rider combination per level or class.
- A protective ASTM approved hard hat with chin harness must be worn when mounted regardless of rider's age or level of competency.
- 7. A Rider is not allowed to enter more than 1 division. (i.e., cannot enter Open and AA.)
  Definitions of Rider Divisions:
  - A. Adult Amateur (AA): for Dressage, competitors shall compete as Adults from the beginning of the calendar year in which they reach age 22 (USEF rules GR101).
  - B. Open division is for professionals as described by USEF rules GR1306.
  - C. Young Riders (JR/YR) are 21 and under.
  - D. Junior 14 (JR14) are 14 years and under.
  - E. Vintage (VIN) are 50 years and over.
- 8. Dressage and Western Dressage Competitors must obtain at three scores of 58.000% or greater from at least two different Judges to count towards IaDCTA Awards. Combined Training Results will be submitted as a placing for the class and awarded points towards a minimum point total to qualify for IaDCTA Awards.
- Complete one type of service per Rider. Volunteer hours can only be earned by laDCTA members, and gifted to other laDCTA members.
  - A. Complete 7 hours of volunteer time at laDCTA Recognized events.
  - B. Recruit 4 new members to laDCTA.
  - C. Donate \$200.00 cash to laDCTA.
- 10. The IaDCTA Show Series Year runs from January 1st to October 31st. (2014 Championship Schooling Show results counts towards 2015 awards.)
- Championship rides (IaDCTA, Regional, or other Championships) do not count towards IaDCTA Awards.

### **IaDCTA Awards**

- IaDCTA Championship Show: The final show of the IaDCTA Show Series year. All Rider/Horse teams with Qualifying scores have an opportunity to ride for a Series Championship Award at their Level within their Division at this show.
  - A. Dressage
  - B. Combined Training
  - C. Western Dressage
- Year End Awards: Awards are given out at the Annual Banquet to recognize the year of achievements. Awards are given out for Rider/Horse teams for each Level and Division.
  - A. Dressage
  - B. Combined Training
  - C. Western Dressage
- Horse of the Year: Awards given out at the Annual Banquet for the horse with the highest average of three tests from two different judges (Scores from AA Handler, Rider Tests, and Freestyles with multiple riders are excluded).
- Breed High Point Awards: High Point Awards are awards given out at the Annual Banquet as provided by Breed Clubs, Associations, or sponsored by individuals.
  - A. Breed Awards (Highest average % of qualifying scores)
- Rider Recognition Awards: Are Awards given out at the Annual Banquet recognizing Rider achievement in their Division.
  - A. Open Rider (Highest average % of qualifying scores)
  - B. AA Rider (Highest average % of qualifying scores)
  - C. Jr/YR rider (Highest average % of qualifying scores)
  - D. JR14 (Highest average % of qualifying scores)
  - E. Vintage (Highest average % of qualifying scores)
- 70% Club: An Award given out at the Annual Banquet recognizing exceptional performance. This Award requires one score at 70.000% or higher from the highest test of the level.
- Rookie of the Year: An Award given out at the Annual Banquet recognizing exceptional performance of a first year IaDCTA member. Must be a first year member with IaDCTA, and have the highest average % of qualifying scores for a given Rider/Horse Team.
- Volunteer Award: An Award given out at the Annual Banquet recognizing the IaDCTA member with the highest hours logged by a single member (gifted hours subtract from individual total).

- Qualified Rider Award Medals: An Award given out at the Annual Banquet to recognize Rider Achievement at their level.
  - A. May be earned over one or more years of competition.
  - B. Scores may be earned on one or more horses.
  - C. After receiving the Gold at a given level, the rider cannot earn another medal at that level
  - D. The Rider Awards program is effective January 1, 1998 and is not retroactive.

### **Combined Training**

### **Combined Training Horse of the Year Award:**

- Scores must be from USEA or USDF dressage score sheets which are current at the time of the competition.
- Placings will be determined by the horse/rider combination with the lowest combined scores using penalty points from dressage and stadium.
- Rider is responsible to keep track and provide proof of their scores and penalty points for each competition (only penalty points from Dressage and Stadium are required). If it is a USEA event, a picture or print out of scores from individual phases will be needed from the event.
- Rider is responsible for completing the High Point Award Form and submitting it to the awards committee before the 6<sup>th</sup> of October of the current show year. A copy of the score sheets with dressage and stadium penalty points will be required.
- To qualify for Combined Training Horse of the Year you will need three scores. Two scores must be from an IaDCTA recognized show. The third can be from either a USEA recognized event or IaDCTA recognized show.
- Scores earned in Championship classes are not eligible for year-end awards. However, scores from Opportunity/schooling show classes at the Championship show are eligible.

### **Combined Training Championships**

To qualify for the Combined Test Championships:

- Each horse/rider MUST have 3 scores from the given level under two different judges and from three different competitions (2 from an IaDCTA competition and 1 from either an IaDCTA or an USEA recognized competition.
- Results from 2 or 3 phase test will be recorded together, only counting penalty points from dressage and stadium in a 3 phase event.

Combined test championships will be offered at the following levels:


